




Mr. Jonathan Nussur

- A-G requirements (15 courses)
 - 2 years of History
 - 4 years of English
 - 3 years of Math
 - 2 years of Science
 - 2 years of Foreign Language
 - 1 year of Electives
 - 1 year of Visual/Performing Arts
- SAT/ACT (*not required for 2020-2021 cycle)

- 1. The application is made up of 7 sections
- Each section tells us a little more about your academic and personal accomplishments
- 3. For this presentation, we'll focus on the following sections:
 - a. About You
 - b. Campus/Major
 - c. Academic History
 - d. Test Scores
 - e. Activities + Awards
 - f. Personal Insight Questions

The UC Application

- 1. About You: Location, household demographics
- 2. Major: What you're interested in studying in college
- 3. Academic History: What classes you took and how you did in those classes
- 4. Test Scores: AP, IB, ACT/SAT, SAT 2
- 5. Activities/Awards: Extracurricular activities, work/volunteer experience, extra classes, and awards won







Personal Insight Questions (PIQs)

- 1. There are 8 total PIQ's
- 2. Only have to respond to 4 of the 8a. 350 word limit for each PIQ
- 3. PIQ's prompts:
 - a. Leadership Style
 - b. Favorite Subject
 - c. How You Express Creativity
 - d. Educational Opportunities
 - e. Educational Barriers
 - f. Personal Challenges
 - g. Giving back to your school or community
 - h. Greatest Skill or Talent



Personal Insight Questions

Think of Personal Insight Questions as instructions, and the other sections of the UC Application as a collection of individual parts.

- With the instructions, you are able to see how those individual parts fit together
- The PIQs are an opportunity for you tell admissions readers why you did something and how you did it.



7 Tips for PIQs

- 1. Each PIQ should contain new information about you
- 2. Answer the Question in the first sentence
- 3. Avoid creative writing if possible
- 4. Give yourself enough time to write 3 drafts
 - 1st draft: write 8 sentences
 - 2nd draft: write 12 sentences
 - 3rd draft: write 16-18 sentences
- 5. Your responses should be about you, not someone else
 - Should also be about your high school years
- 6. Do your research!
 - Skills: What skills do you have? What skills do you need to develop? Communicate this in your PIQs
 - Majors: What college majors are you considering? What have you done to learn about those majors? How have you prepared for those majors? Communicate this in your PIQs
- 7. Talk about what you hope to do in College
